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# Untaxed Liquor Seized In McNairy County Raid

## Supply In Trailer Valued At \$10,000

McNairy County Sheriff Buford Pusser, acting yesterday on information supplied him, raided a large U-Haul trailer parked behind a Guys, Tenn., restaurant and confiscated liquor valued at approximately \$10,000.

Arrested and charged with possession of untaxed liquor and with possession of five arms were 43-year-old J. J. Gullage of Houston, Tex., and Tommy Moseley, 35. Moseley gave a Louisiana address.

Sheriff Pusser said he received information that the trailer was parked behind the Old Hickory Restaurant about halfway between Highway 45 and Guys on the Guys Road. He said he was assisted in the raid by Deputy Sheriff P. B. Plunk.

He said the 14 by 6-foot trailer contained 2,448 pints, 1,584 half-pints and 204 fifths of liquor. Also taken in the raid were a 38 caliber Smith and Wesson pistol, an automatic shotgun, a 30-30 high powered rifle and a 32 caliber automatic pistol.

"All the weapons were load-

ed," Sheriff Pusser reported.

Pusser said the pair did not offer any resistance but were apparently expecting trouble because all the weapons were loaded and within easy reach.

He said the trailer was registered to a Carl Hathcock of Houston, Tex., and the 1959 Oldsmobile, used to pull the trailer, was registered to a Dorothy Mitchell of Franklin, La. He said an investigation is still being conducted by his department.

Both Gullage and Moseley were scheduled to appear in McNairy County General Sessions Court at Selmer at 2 p.m. today. Judge Clyde Treece will be the presiding judge.

Pusser said the liquor would be sent to Nashville where a Tennessee stamp would be applied and that McNairy County would receive 50 per cent of the proceeds derived from the liquor. The car was also taken and will be turned over to the state, Pusser said.
